

Speaking of reading a good book, we have received copies of LIST Chapter member Mike Boland's new book which is titled, the Long Island Rail Road Multiple Unit Cars Volume 1 Cars Built 1905 – 1949. LIRR NEWS by Steve Quigley

The LIRR has almost 75% of its track miles covered by PTC which is the federally mandated Positive Train Control. The latest activation of PTC is from Patchogue to Montauk and from Ronkonkoma to Greenport. The LIRR as well as other railroads in the US have until December 31 of this year to complete activation of PTC or risks fines that could be as much as \$29,000 per day. PTC as you know, is communication technology that is designed to prevent rail collisions by automatically slows or halts trains that are in violation of the signals along a section of track. PTC is now up and running on most LIRR lines. An outside PTC consultant has called the LIRR progress "really remarkable" with LIRR President Philip Eng optimistic that the LIRR will meet the Federal deadline for the implementation of PTC.

As you know, the Corona Virus has hit the NY Metropolitan area very hard. Most businesses have either closed or are asking their employees to work from home if possible. Thus, travel on Long Island has been impacted in a manner that few of us could ever dream. Rush hour on Long Island parkways and the Expressway no longer has traffic jams. Cars move at the speed limit or even higher during the morning and evening rush hours. Naturally, the LIRR has been greatly impacted. The LIRR schedule is and has been an "Essential Service Schedule" which is similar to a weekend schedule with many trains being minimally used. I have been told that most trains on the Port Washington Branch are almost empty of passengers versus the Ronkonkoma and Babylon Branches. A few extra trains have actually been added to the rush hours on the Babylon and Ronkonkoma branches to accommodate construction workers, first responders and essential services workers going to their jobs in NYC where the normal weekend service is not sufficient.

Since the LIRR is running on this modified weekend schedule, a full complement of cars is not needed. Thus, for the time being, the LIRR is running exclusively its M-7 cars. The remaining fleet of M-3 and M-9 cars has been mothballed and will be returned to service when regular service is implemented. For the time being, you will see only M-7 cars running on the LIRR.

I have been told that the decommissioning and demolition of Nassau Tower has been put on hold due to the corona virus crisis.

My wish of staying safe and good health goes to all of the people of the NY Metropolitan area and especially to our Health Care workers and the people of LIRR and MTA whom are critical to the running of our Tri-State area transportation and the movement of its people.

This Month's Feature:

Two Forty Foot Boxcar Kits - Part 1

Yes, COVID-19 can even affect the LIRR Modeler. I haven't gotten it so that's good but it has affected my life to the point where I haven't had the opportunity to work on the window arrangements of my favorite parlor-lounge cars, ELKS CLUB and LIONS CLUB, that I wrote about earlier. Therefore, I'm going to take a temporary break on this project for a bit and work on something else. The "something else" turned out to be two 40 foot boxcar kits and they both were a fun and interesting diversion from what I was doing.

Let's face it, everyone who models the LIRR can use a number of 40 foot boxcars on his layout insofar as the 40 foot steel boxcar was a staple of American railroads' rolling stock for many years until it was displaced by the 50 foot boxcar, as well as longer cars, and the use of containers riding on flatcars. Today, boxcars are still around but they are not used as frequently as other types of rolling stock, particularly the covered hopper, which has apparently become more popular and is seen in many freight trains nowadays. Watch a freight train at trackside today and observe the number of covered hoppers, and boxcars in the consist.

I've found that kits are an inexpensive way to build a boxcar fleet. I bought an Accurail Pittsburgh & Lake Erie 40 foot steel boxcar kit (#8111.1). It's a good-looking car in Boxcar Red paint with white lettering and the New York Central logo above the PLE reporting marks to the left of the door. On the right side was the name PITTSBURGH & LAKE ERIE; beneath it was the slogan: "Serves the Steel Centers" in script. All the lettering on the car is white except for the CENTRAL in the logo, which has a black background while the rest of the NYC oval logo does not.

This car with its sealed single six-foot door was numbered 20697 and was easy to assemble. You'll need some Walthers Goo to glue the metal weight to the car floor before you do anything else. This kit is a one-piece body construction so there really isn't much to be done.

The underbody piping and details have to be put on along with the couplers. I don't like the E-Z Mate couplers provided in the kit, so I replaced them with Kadee #148's. I put the wheels in the trucks and made sure they were free rolling. Then I screwed the trucks to the underbody. Of course, the trucks, underbody detail and couplers must be painted a weathered brown to make the car look more realistic.

I also elected to put the roofwalk on the car and placed it using the holes on the roof that were pre-drilled. If you don't put the roofwalk on the car, you are dating the car as a post-1966 car as that was the time when the FRA allowed the railroads to remove the roofwalk. It's your choice as to what you want to do here; what era you model, or time frame should really determine whether your boxcars have roofwalks or not. So, in a couple of hours you'll have a



great-looking boxcar that is ready for service.

Next time, I'll write about a 40 foot Norfolk Southern (old) HO Trainman Boxcar Kit by Atlas, which is another inexpensive kit to assemble that will allow you to build your boxcar fleet. This kit is a little different but will come together easily and make a great model, ready to be weathered and then put into service.


