On Wednesday October 5th, we were given a fantastic tour of Grand Central Madison, the new LIRR station under Grand Central Terminal. The 1.5 hour long tour was conducted by Paige Biancamano, who is the Director, Communications and Community Outreach MTACC East Side Access. Paige was very informative and was able to answer all the questions that she was presented with. For example, the escalators are longer than 180' and take 2 minutes to go from top to bottom. We had seen a wide open tunnel when we took the tour in 2014. The wide open cavern of then has been filled in with 2 levels of platforms, track, future retail space as well as LIRR ticket windows. The lettering style of platforms and tracks on the walls is a duplicate of the lettering of upstairs Grand Central Terminal. Thanks to Paige, we all enjoyed a fantastic and informative tour of the soon to be opened Grand Central Madison.

Don't forget, Trains magazine published an extensive article on East Side Access last October. 



The Christopher Morley Knothole Association is pleased to sponsor a program by David Morrison at its fall meeting, which will be held at the Bryant Library on Thursday, November 3, 2022 at 6:30 P.M. Mr. Morrison, whose love of the LIRR is mirrored by Christopher Morley's, will share insights and anecdotes from his nine illustrated books about the railroad that has played such a key role in the development of Long Island. The meeting is free and open to the public, there will be a book prize raffle, and refreshments will be served. Parents and young adults are especially welcomed.

Mr. Morrison's interest in railroads began as a boy in Croton Point Park, New York, where he marveled at the steam trains in the rail yards before they were phased out. After working as a chemical engineer, David turned to a career in railroading, serving as a branch line manager for the LIRR. He has many stories to tell from his years with the company, including the time he arranged the only wedding ever to be held in a LIRR station waiting room!

Mr. Morrison is the author of nine books in Arcadia Publishing's "Images of Rail" series. He is a charter member of the Railroad Museum of Long Island, serves on the station restoration committee of the Oyster Bay Railroad Museum, and is a long-time member of the Long Island Sunrise Trail chapter of the National Railway Historical Society.

The LIRR Modeler by Mike Boland

THIS MONTH'S FEATURE: ATTENDING THE 2022 NEW ENGLAND RAILROAD PROTOTYPE MODELERS MEET IN SPRINGFIELD, MA. IN JUNE

Two of the best RPM meets occur in the summer. One is the "St. Louis RPM Meet" that is held in Collinsville, IL. in July or August. The other is the "NE RPM Meet,"

that is, the New England/Northeast Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet, that was held on Friday, June 10 and Saturday, June 11, this year.

This year the meet had a new location, LaQuinta Inn & Suites by Wyndham on 100 Congress Street in Springfield, MA. The Inn & Suites proved to be an excellent locale for over 200 modelers who came from everywhere to participate in the two days of activities. In addition there were vendors and models, lots of models and modelers.

I volunteered to present my "All About Grade Crossings" Power Point show and Dave Owens, meet director, and his group graciously accepted my offer and I had a good crowd of people at my presentation.

I drove on Thursday afternoon to meet another modeling friend, Ray Jensen of Ft. Myers (yes, THT Ft. Myers!) who accompanied me for the two-day fest. It was not a long ride but I regreted that I had not stopped at Palmer to visit their hobby shop. Next year I'll do it for sure.

There were a number of fine presentations during the two days of activities.

Among the ones I attended were two offerings on Thursday night for early arrivals. Adam Twombly offered "22 States in 2021," a fabulous offering of some heavy-duty railfanning that Adam did in Connecticut and Massachusetts, as well as Florida and other locales with CN Iron Range action to Kansas City Southern's Rich Mountain area along the Arkansas/Oklahoma border.

This was followed by Craig Zeni, who presented the photos of J. David Ingles. Ingles was a longtime contributor and on the staff of TRAINS Magazine of Kalmbach Publishing fame and he left hundreds of slides to various historical societies. Craig presented a sampling of slides donated to the Penn Central Railroad Historical Society. It was great fun to see black and white PC units as well as all kinds of patch jobs all over the place as viewers tried to guess the locations of many shots.

Both shows were very entertaining.

The next morning, Friday, off I went to the first day of two solid days of entertaining and informative presentations on a variety of subjects.

George Melvin did a good job on his "Bangor & Aroostock Freight Equipment & Operations:1950 -1980." Bill Badger did his clinic on modeling late AC Mack trucks and other vehicles as well.

After lunch, our good buddy Steve Funaro, accompanied by his son, presented a hands-on clinic. It was about the construction of a resin PRR G22 gondola kit. Steve's clinic offered reduced prices for the G22's to work on and it was limited to 25 modelers.

I even bought a few extra kits since Steve made assembling these cars so easy. I will soon have a number of PRR gondolas on my roster. Great!

I did my "Grade Crossings" show from 2:30pm to 3:30pm and I finished up with Dave Ramos' "Rise of the Lightning Stripes." This was about New York Harbor railroad operations and modeling challenges.

Then there was a break for dinner with two more shows after eating. I attended Leo Landry's very informative program about kitbashing 50-foot boxcars to achieve 40-foot cars of the 50's, 60's and 70's that are not commercially available.

Another great show followed: it was done by Eric Hirsh, who covered rail marine model building with tips and tricks.

Throughout the day Ted Dilorio and Dave Ramos led a hands-on clinic on weathering. Modelers had to supply their own models.

And then that was it for Friday. Sadly, there were other clinics that I would have loved to attend but simply couldn't.

Saturday, June 11, started with another great lineup of shows. First, my friend Mike Chapman, an NBC veteran and TV news professional, and Ted Shasta presented a show on simplifying complex interlockings with NX Interlocking stands with Arduinos and some basic programming.

Next was Randy Laframboise presented a very informative show: "Moving Milk on the Rutland Mainline Subdivision: Operations, facilities and equipment for moving milk from farms in Vermont's Champlain Valley to Boston and New York City. It also had tips from Randy and Mike Sparks on how to model this iconic and picturesque industry in the 1950's. Way to go, guys!

I was so moved by the show that I sent them a shot of a LIRR DD1 and milk train by Jamaica that Harold Fagerberg took in the 1930s from my collection! Way to go, Harold!

After lunch, it was Dave Oppedisano who covered designing and modeling the BNSF Lakeside Subdivision in HO scale with emphasis on track planning, construction methods and signal control with CMRI.

Tom Jacobs then took over and offered "Realizing the Reading Empire: Episode III. Tom went into the continuing construction of his Reading Railroad empire in HO.

A most interesting but confusing (at least to me!) was Jim Schweitzer's show, which covered Manual Block Operations on the LIRR, past and present. I learned a lot, was confused a little and came away with a better understanding of what goes on out east on the LIRR's Montauk and Greenport Branches with this quaint PRR-style operation. I'm not ready to qualify yet, but it was very informative.

After dinner, it was Brian Carlson's show on Rust Belt Boxcars. He covered common cars and where to find them; his show was a primer on Northeastern railroads and where to find data on them. Next, friend Tim Garner of the PRRTHS's "East Wind," the New England Chapter's fine quarterly magazine did a show on his PRR layout. Tim scrapped his 22 year-old proto-freelanced PRR layout to start over and model real places, discussing goals, research, compromises and lessons as well as the next steps.

I also did look at some just incredible modeling and spend some time in the Vendors' Room. I managed to purchase a foursome of PRR P70s with air-conditioning, some freight cars and three of Funaro & Camerlengo's "new" LIRR P72's, which I hope to convert to MU versions. I had told F&C to bring them here and they obliged. Thanks!

Well, that's it for now. This is just a great show and Dave Owens and his crew did a sensational job on this. Many thanks, guys! This is ONE meet that every modeler MUST ATTEND!

LIRR News by Steve Quigley

The LIRR's Third Track Project formally known as "Main Line Expansion," which is a nearly 10 mile long corridor through the heart of Nassau County is now open. Although some of the stations as well as landscaping have not been completed, the third track is now operational in time for the soon to be completed East Side Access project to Grand Central Madison. The grand opening of the project was met with much fanfare on 10/3. The \$2.5 Billion project was begun in 2019 and completed on time and under budget as per MTA officials.

The grand opening ceremony was held in the Westbury train station parking garage which was built in conjunction with the Third Track Project. Prior LIRR Presidents Helena Williams and Phil Eng as well as the current interim President, Catherine Rinaldi were all in attendance at the ceremony as well as MTA chairman Jano Lieber. There were dignitaries, politicians as well as LIRR employees and much media coverage [LIST Chapter member Dave Morrison and I attended the ceremony] It was mentioned that the third track between Hicksville and Floral Park will boost service to stations on the Main Line by as much as 40% and will provide flexibility in the event of service disruptions as well as now providing reverse commuters in the morning and evening rush hours many more trains. Several trains in the AM rush used to run westbound on the eastbound tracks due to high train traffic volume and this blocked eastbound service from occurring. No longer will that be necessary! The completion of the Third Track Project has resulted in upgrades to the stations along the line as well as the elimination of all grade crossings between Jamaica and Hicksville. There were Eight crossings! This is an incredible feat of engineering considering disruption in service along the corridor occurred on weekends!

The LIRR's new station at the UBS area is now open for service in both directions on days when there are events such as Islander hockey and will serve passengers round the clock by the end of this year. Westbound service to the Elmont station began October 6in time for the first Islander pre-season game of the year. No longer will riders coming from the east have to travel to Jamaica and then reverse to Elmont. Having service in both directions was a result of the Third Track Project being completed. [The station signs still show Elmont station but it is technically Elmont-UBS90% of the funding to build the new station came from the UBS area developers and the remaining 10% from New York State.

LIRR train crews are learning to operate trains on the new stretch of track between Sunnyside Yard and Grand Central Madison. Engineers, conductors and dispatchers are or will be undergoing training on the 8 miles of new tunnels and 40+ miles of new track. Employees undergo classroom as well as in service training on the characteristics of the new line to and from the new station. This new link to Grand Central Terminal took 15 years to build and is estimated to cost over \$11 Billion. In a departure from traditional methods, crew members must monitor a video feed from cameras mounted in the front the train which reveals the configuration of tracks, switches and electrical systems mounted on the tunnel walls. It is estimated that the grand opening of Grand Central Madison will take place this December.

As I have mentioned previously, 2022 will be an incredible year of changes and improvements to the LIRR and its employees!
