

The LIRR Modeler by Mike Boland

THIS MONTH'S FEATURE: ATTENDING THE PROTO RAILS 2022 RAILROAD PROTOTYPE MODELERS MEET IN COCOA BEACH JANUARY 6-8, 2022 PART 1

I'm going to interrupt my modeling features to write about an event I have not attended in two years: the Proto Rails 2022 Railroad Prototype Modelers Meet at Cocoa Beach, Florida on January 6th, 7th, and 8th this past January at the Hilton Hotel by the mighty and majestic Atlantic Ocean on the Space (East) Coast.

Last year's meet was not held due to Covid so there was an eagerness to get back to normal this year and it showed. This year we had a total of 217 attendees, although a lot of "big" names, like Ted Culotta, Tony Thompson, Tony Koester, and others could not attend, either due to the resurgence of Covid in the last few weeks or the terrible weather in some parts of the country. Nonetheless, after a little scrambling, the meet's array of interesting and informative clinics went on without a hitch. Kudos to Mike Brock (a fine modeler in HO scale in his own right) and his superb team for executing another fine meet. And Jeff Aley, our tech guy, did his usual fine job going from room to room, making sure clinics were without problems.

Great job, gentlemen!!!

I arrived at the Hilton Hotel on the late afternoon of January, 6th after some Moh's surgery on my ear and cheek that morning. It's about a three-hour drive from my condo in Venice on the Gulf Coast just south of Sarasota to Cocoa Beach via I-75, I-4 and State Road 528, a toll road that finally now has accepted EZ Pass; I had my SunPass anyway. Everything was OK and it was a nice and pleasant drive across the state and I whizzed through several tollbooths with no problem.

I was scheduled to present my show, "All About Grade Crossings," that night (Thursday) at 8pm. It was one of five other shows being offered for early-arriving modelers and railfans that night. My show was well-attended and was well-received.

I just wish I had the time to attend one of the clinics scheduled at the same time as mine; it was "Modeling the Ocean." I figured I could always learn about modeling water since this is something I really want to do on my layout. After all, how could you NOT model the LIRR without water.

At any rate, my attendees enjoyed the show and I had an audience of about 25. One has to remember that a good number of attendees are arriving at the same time as the evening's clinics; Friday and Saturday are both days that are full with two sets of clinics in the morning, three in the afternoon following lunch and two in the evening after dinner. Each clinician, speak or "expert" is given an hour for his presentation; it's normally a 45-minute show with 15 minutes at the end for questions and comments. I usually tell my audience to ask questions as soon as they want, since I don't like to "go back" to slides and images once I've shown them.

Since it was a success, I hope to build future shows on a variety of subjects.

Incidentally, I hope to present this show to the LIST membership soon.

LIRR News by Steve Quigley

The first "Blizzard" to hit Long Island started on Friday night 1/28 and lasted through a good portion of Saturday1/29. Islip McArthur airport recorded 24" of snow which may be the highest amount on LI. It was technically declared a Blizzard in Suffolk County. Here in Babylon, we had approximately 20" of snow. The East End had the most snow with amounts lessening the further west you went with the western portions of N J receiving only a light amount. The LIRR was deliberately shut down Saturday morning however; the deicing train as well as equipment/patrol trains were seen rolling through the Island to clear tracks, the third rail and switches/turnouts. An army of 1,700 LIRR workers were deployed to clear station platforms, tracks, yards and any areas were the snow was piling up fast. At times, certain areas of Suffolk County had snowfall rates of 2'-3' per hour. "Darth Vader," the LIRR's super snow fighting piece of equipment which may also be used as a spreader, was spotted on the Main Line fighting North Fork drifts and it went as far east as the Greenport yard. Two NY & A GP38-2's were the motive power for Darth Vader. The GP38's are leased by the LIRR to the NY & A and it appears that the LIRR reserves the right to use them in certain cases.

LIRR limited service resumed Sunday morning which considering the amount of snow, was a quick recovery for a substantial portion of the system. Bus service was provided on Sunday on the lines east of Speonk and Ronkonkoma.

The LIRR is celebrating a new high for system wide on time performance for 2021. It was reported that On Time Performance of 96.3% is the best since timekeeping began in the 1970's. The LIRR considers a train to be on time when it arrives at its destination with 5 minutes and 59 seconds of its scheduled arrival time. The LIRR Forward performance program which was implemented by LIRR President Phillip Eng in 2018 has resulted in substantially fewer delays and cancelations. A few of the items that the LIRR Forward implemented are as follows:

The installation of grade crossing delineators which has greatly reduced people driving onto tracks at crossings. In conjunction with this, certain apps such as Waze have been revised to make sure that drivers do not turn on to LIRR tracks when a road is adjacent to a RR crossing.

The use of the Laser Train among other actions to reduce trains being taking out of service due to slip slide issues.

The hardening of equipment, switches and electronics. Electrical components in flood prone areas such as Long Beach and Island Park have been elevated to reduce to likelihood of damage due to flooding.

NY Governor Kathy Hochul proposed building the "Interborough Express" service which would connect Brooklyn and Queens from Bay Ridge to Jackson Heights. The service would use the existing rail right-of-way which would include the Bay Ridge branch and the Fremont Secondary. An environmental review will be performed to study the feasibility of the restoration of passenger service. Although the existing right-of-way is intact and being used by the NY&A, several items must be addressed before service can be implemented. One of the items is how access for the NY&freight will be maintained. The routes are the main access for freight rail traffic on and off Long Island by CSX to upstate New York via Hell Gate Bridge or NYNJ's Cross Harbor railcar float from the float bridges at Bay Ridge to Greenville NJ. The last passenger service on the Bay Ridge branch is thought to have been in 1924.

The Railroad Museum of Long Island by Don Fisher

Thinking of Spring at the Railroad Museum of Long Island and the month of March, we are again planning an Educational Forum. Please consider joining us on Saturday, March 19, 2022 at 1:00 PM for a presentation on the "New York and North Shore Traction Company." Historian Joe Bux will take us from Flushing to Hicksville on the electric "light rail" line that roughly paralleled the Long Island Port Washington Branch beginning in 1910. Trolleys dotted Long Island, providing local north-south transportation to and from town centers and the Long Island Rail Road's predominantly east-west routes. These 4' 8½" standard gauge railways were but just another part of "Long Island's Rich Railroading History!"

When we speak of railroads on Long Island, we must speak of maritime history as well. From the LIRR's initial ignorance toward the North and South Shores – everyone moved by ship in the early 1800's anyway – to the Rail Road's dependence on ships to transit their passengers to Boston via Long Island Sound, to the LIRR's Navy of steam passenger ships, ferry boats, tugs and barges. Join us for "A Concert in the Boxcar" at Greenport RMLI on Sunday, June 19, 2022 at 2:00 PM. American Music Historian, Stephen Sanfilippo will offer us traditional music and stories from "Rails and Sails" and he promises a new song dedicated to history on the Long Island Rail Road. Watch your website ~ rmli.org ~ for more news and schedules for another summer of Mini-Events Under the Big Top at Riverhead.

Due to the continuing COVID business, we will once again postpone the *Riverhead Railroad Festival* in August 2022.
