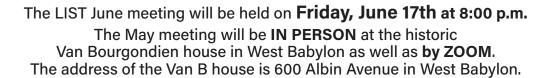

We are working on our 2023 LIRR calendar so if you wish to contribute, please send in your photos, slides etc as soon as possible. We are always looking for very old photos of LIRR rolling stock, stations and people, the older the better. If the old photos are not perfect in quality, send them to me anyway as unique photos can always be used. If you send digital photos, please make sure they are at least 600 dpi.

On May 13th, we were given a very interesting tour of the Brookhaven Rail Terminal in Yaphank. The 28 acre site was opened in 2011 and construction has begun to more than double the site size of the terminal. Our tour was conducted by Mr. Andrew Kaufman who is the President of the Brookhaven Rail Terminal. The tour was more than 1 hour long and we were afforded a walking tour of the entire site including the 200,000 square foot warehouse facility where lumber among other items is stored for future distribution. Attached are photos of the facility including a photo of a box car which is being unloaded inside the warehouse by a forklift. Home Depot uses the BRT as a distribution facility for items such as bulk lumber and construction material for all of its stores in Suffolk, Nassau, Queens, Brooklyn and the Bronx. The material is brought in by train and then loaded on to trucks for its various stores. The BRT handles bulk material as well as aggregate.

Thank you Mr. Kaufman for a very interesting tour of the expanding facility which takes thousands of

trucks off our roads each year!

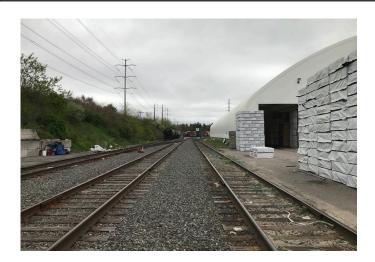

The former LIRR Brentwood station has been converted into a unique restaurant which serves a fusion menu with Halal Pakistani and Latin American cuisine. The restaurant is named "La Estacion" which translated means The Station. The building was the LIRR Brentwood station from 1905 until 1987 and was vacant until 2006 when it became a café. The café closed in 2009 and was vacant until 2018. It has extensive indoor and outdoor seating.

The former LIRR Speonk train station became "The Little Gull Café" last year which is another example of a former LIRR station being saved and used for another purpose. We wish both restaurants great success and a long life. [I have visited the Little Gull Café in Speonk several times and have found the food to be excellent and reasonably priced in a charming atmosphere - an old LIRR station! SQ]

The March and April editions of RailPace magazine have excellent articles written by LIST Chapter members Andrew Grahl and William J. Skeats. THIS MONTH'S FEATURE: A FOND LOOK BACK AT MODEL RAILROADER MAGAZINE OF 1983

I thought it might be interesting to take a nostalgic look at Model Railroader magazine as I close out this "season" of articles that appear in the SEMAPHORE. On a recent visit to Centerline Hobbies in Hyannis, I came across two copies of the "MR" magazine and I purchased them. Centerline always has an ample supply of these old MR magazines and they can be had at a very cheap price. So I bought two copies, one from February 1983 and the other from December 1983. Both copies cost \$1.75 when new, which is only 25 cents more than what the magazine cost me to buy almost 40 years later. I bought them at the hobby shop and in later years, I subscribed by mail

The first thing I noticed—and this is very obvious—is the size or thickness of the magazine. Both of these issues were pretty thick compared to today's issues, which run about 76 pages. February 1983 MR, with its cover article "Industry comes to the Jerome and Southwestern" had 172 pages! December 1983 MR had 204 pages! Wow!

So many pages! And so many advertisers! There were 223 advertisers in the February issue. Man, that's a lot! Do you remember any of these? Perry's Hobbies. America's Hobby Center, Inc. on West 22nd St. in Manhattan. How about Broad Ripple Station? I bought a lot of brass locomotives at great prices from him. World of Trains. Nickel Plate Products HO Gauge Brass Models. Overland Models—I believe they are still around.

Sunset Models, Peco, Walthers, Athearn, Key Imports, and the beloved Madison Hardware. Bookbinder's (Lionel) "Trains unlimited," LMB Models, Charles Ro—he's still around and about 90 minutes away from me by car. Bowser's still here and about to bring in the correct LIRR Phase III ALCo RS3's painted in my beloved World's Fair paint scheme. Roundhouse I/Roundhouse II were two hobby shops, one in White Plains and the other in Manhattan. Standard Hobby Supply in Mahwah, NJ.

Walthers. Oriental Limited. The Train Shop, in Carmen Webster's old store in the basement of 23 West 45th St. in midtown Manhattan. Caboose Hobbies. Pro Custom Hobbies, Inc. San Antonio Hobby Shop. The Original Whistlestop.

Both magazines had lots and lots of great and helpful articles. One of my favorites was "Paint Shop" and at that time written by Jim Hediger. There was also MR Clinic, another monthly feature.

How about NJ Custom Brass? Jack and Nick were really good to LIRR modelers such as myself by bringing in a number of LIRR items in brass in HO scale.

Alco Models was good to us, too. Train World in Brooklyn and Trainland in Lynbrook. The Red Caboose. Cary Locomotive Works. Champ Decals, they made some great LIRR decals in both O and HO scale. Clover House. Cal-Scale. Gilbert's Hobby Shop. There were prints available from paintings by Gil Reid. Model Die Casting. All kinds of books from Kalmbach. Mitchell's Brass. Owen Upp Railroader's Supply Company. Miller Advertising (decals).

The magazine back then had a paid circulation of 180, 265.

Where did they all go? Some are still with us but many are not, unfortunately.

The hobby, though, continues to thrive and indeed, these are great times for us.

LIRR News by Steve Quigley

The long awaited completion of the LIRR's \$11.2 billion East Side Access project is nearing completion and it will result about a 50% boost in LIRR rush hour service. However, a side effect is a significant reduction of LIRR service into Penn Station. In the last week in May, it was announced that the name for the new station which is below Grand Central Terminal, will be "GRAND CENTRAL MADISON." As previously announced, the expected grand opening for the station is expected to be this coming December. It is expected that a person who commutes on the LIRR to GCM will reduce their commuting time up to 40 minutes per day if they work on the East side of Manhattan.

Once the project is complete, it is expected that the LIRR will increase the total number of westbound trains into Manhattan from the current 113 to 159 trains. The Eastbound evening rush will see a greater percentage increase in that there will be 158 trains from the current 98. This will means trains to Huntington and Ronkonkoma will see service every ½ hour and trains to Mineola and Hicksville will see service every 15 minutes.

Due to this, there will be 10 fewer trains into Penn in the morning but there will be 3 more trains in the evening rush. [All of this is subject to change the closer in time we get to the opening of GCM. SQ] While all this is going on, the current LIRR Penn Station concourse is being renovated with the ceiling being increased to 18' all the way across from its prior barrel shape and the concourse is being widened from 30' to 57'. There will be a new elevator to the concourse as well as for elevator replacements. All of the prior retail establishments are gone, the pizza restaurants, beer stands, breakfast shops etc. and they will be replaced with higher end retail and dining establishments! The renovations are expected to be completed in the first quarter of 2023.

In addition, the LIRR Expansion Project is being completed with a Third Track being installed between Hicksville and Floral Park. As previously noted, the Expansion Project is 9.8 miles in length, 8 grade crossings were eliminated, 7 bridges were modified and 6 stations were enhanced. All of this was done with minimal taking of private property along the Right-of-Way. The 3rd Track Project is also expected to be completed in December of this year.

This is an incredible amount of construction, changes, renovations and improvements to the LIRR that should be completed by the middle of 2023! If the price of gas continues to rise, the ridership on the LIRR might rise to levels approaching that of 2019 level as commuters will see that the LIRR is less expensive and more convenient than driving a car!

Islander hockey fans and concert goers to the new UBS Arena in Elmont will be able to take the train from the east as well as the west when the Islander 2022-2023 hockey season opens. This past November, the new Elmont-UBS arena station opened but only to eastbound riders. Riders coming from the Island had to travel to Jamaica then change to a Hempstead bound train to Elmont station. However, riders coming in on the Babylon and Montauk lines will still have to travel to Jamaica and then change to a Hempstead train.

A pedestrian overpass was installed in March of this year over the course of 1 weekend and it connected the east and westbound platforms. Presently, the Elmont station is only used when events are scheduled at the UBS arena but when the 3rd Track Project is completed, it is expected that round the clock service to the Elmont station will take place.

In last month's Semaphore, we updated you on each of our exciting projects. Things continue to progress at an impressive pace. Steam Locomotive #35 continues to be put back together and the crew working on our Ping Pong Coach has begun experimenting with their new "hot riveting" tools, honing their skills with this ages old artform of construction... or in our case, reconstruction. Meanwhile our forces have descended upon the World's Fair Alco Cab and Dinky Diesel #398 performing body and paint work, and our display tracks #1 and #2 are fully complete. There's even a few exciting surprises we have to report, but we'll save that till September!

Please be sure to follow us on Facebook as we post weekly updates on all projects with lots of exciting photos. You'll also get a "heads up" for when our riggers move numerous pieces of equipment onto the display tracks by crane, as well as the following installation of display tracks #3 and #7. Suffice to say its going to be a very busy summer at the Oyster Bay Railroad Museum! Remember, we're open to the public Saturdays and Sundays, 12 noon to 1pm, with turntable rides offered on Saturdays ONLY at 1pm and 3pm.

The Education Committee hosted 4 elementary classroom visits from the Theodore Roosevelt School in May. These were well-received and a continuation of the program that was suspended during the Covid restrictions period. On another note, please be sure to support our annual fundraising event, the Summer Solstice, being held on Tuesday June 21 from 7 - 10PM. This year's theme is a Night in Italy and features great food and beverage, live music and fabulous raffle prizes.

The museum is now open to the public on Saturdays and Sundays from Noon to 4pm. Turntable rides are offered on Saturdays ONLY at 1pm and 3pm. The station is expected to be open beginning June 4th.
