

L I S T trip chairman, Bob Grant, is working on several tours and trips for Chapter members this coming spring. We have tentatively scheduled the tour of the Danbury Railway Museum on May 18th! We will be meeting at Grand Central Terminal and taking a Metro-North train to Danbury. We will stay at the Museum for several hours and then all will be taking a train back to GCT. Train times and cost will follow in the April and May editions of the Semaphore. We hope to have the group reduced fare on Metro-North.

The Danbury Museum has locomotive cab rides, passenger car rides and caboose rides around the 10 acre site. In addition, they also provide locomotive rides whereby you can be the engineer. It's a great museum as I have been there recently and I know you will enjoy the day! We will keep you informed.

Don't forget, the 190th Anniversary of the LIRR is April 24th. We/LIST will be part of the celebration. I have been told that a ceremony will take place honoring the 190th anniversary in Grand Central Madison station on the morning of April 24th. I will let you know the specific time next month. An exhibit showcasing LIRR memorabilia will be located in GCM. In addition, a rail trip to Greenport on July 27th is in the planning stages. The train will have a special drumhead with a private car or cars for the special riders/us! There will be giveaways and raffles among other things. On that day during the layover in Greenport, there will be special celebration dedicating a plaque sponsored by the Pomeroy Foundation. The plaque commemorates the 180th anniversary of the 1st train to Greenport on July 27th, 1844. The Railroad Museum of LI at Greenport will have a special celebration that day.

We [LIST] will be publishing a book similar to our 175th and 185th anniversary books with all new stories about the LIRR in time for the April 24th anniversary.

Continuing with the information provided in the April 1984 edition of "Along the Track," Did you know that the Long Island Rail Road's Main Line was completed as follows:

Brooklyn to Jamaica –April 26, 1836 Jamaica to Hicksville-March 1, 1837 To Hardscrabble [Farmingdale] October 15, 1841 To Deer Park- March 13, 1842 To Thompson's [Brentwood]-June 24, 1842 To Suffolk Station [Central Islip] –July 14, 1842 To Yaphank-June 26, 1844 To Greenport- July 27, 1844

"What's in a Name?"

In the April 1984 edition of the "Along the Track," the following column was noted.

LIRR's present-day names are derived, or changed or altered from colorful names of the past, and today's commuter would be hard-pressed to identify 1984 stations from the names that some had at one time. For example:

Calverton- Baiting Hollow, Hulse's Turnout
Lynbrook-Pearsallville, Pearsall, Pearsall's Corner
Baldwin-Millburn, Foxborough, Baldwins, Baldwinsville
Massapequa-South Oyster Bay
Lindenhurst-Wellwood, Breslau
Babylon-Seaside
Bay Shore-Pentaquit
Bellport-Bartlett's Station
Eastport-Moriches, Robinson's Grove, Seatuck
More to follow next month!

NOW:

The LIRR will be purchasing and adding a battery powered locomotive to its fleet that will be used to tow trains that break down in the tunnels to and from Grand Central Madison station. [Hopefully, it never needs to be used! SQ] LIRR Acting President Rob Free stated that the locomotive will not have to operate on third-rail power should it have to rescue a train in the tunnels to GCM. Since the tunnels to GCM are smaller than the tunnels to Penn Station and Atlantic Terminal and diesel powered locos are not allowed, a special smaller locomotive is needed

In addition, Mr. Free announced that a contract was put out to bid for the construction of a new station in Yaphank. The MTA referred to this new station as the "New East Yaphank Station." The proposal calls for a two car train platform, a parking lot with 50 spaces, a platform shelter shed and a Kiss and Ride loop for drop offs. The proposed station would be further east than the present station and would be east of the William Floyd Parkway and south of the LIE. It is hoped that construction would begin by the end of this year.

On April 24th of this year, the LIRR will be celebrating its 190th Anniversary. It is planned that a celebration will take place in Grand Central Madison on that day, most likely in the morning. I believe the ceremony will most likely be for the media, however, if you happen to be in GCM at that time, I believe you will be able to witness it. There will also be display cases showcasing various items of LIRR memorabilia.

If the ceremony is made available for viewing, I will try and obtain a copy or direct you to where it can be seen.

Railroad Museum of Long Island by Don Fisher, RMLI President

The Southampton Historical Society, partnering with the Railroad Museum of Long Island, will recognize two significant milestones in the history of Long Island. 190 years ago, on April 24, 1832, the Long Island Rail Road was granted its Charter. 180 years ago, on Saturday, July 27, 1844 the first LIRR train completed its journey across the mainline from Brooklyn to Greenport.

To celebrate these milestones the Southampton History Museum located at 17 Meetinghouse Lane, Southampton, NY will exhibit items and memorabilia from their collections and those of the Railroad Museum. March and April 2024, Wednesday-Saturday, 11:00 AM – 4:00 PM. Admission: \$10.00 for adults 17 years and older, FREE for children through 16 years and museum members. Group rates of 6 or more guests is \$8.00 per person.

Continuing the LIRR Anniversary Celebrations, the Railroad Museum of Long Island is pleased to announce our 2024 Educational Forum, "The First Train to Greenport - July 27, 1844."

Please join us on Saturday, March 23, 2024 at 10:30 AM for a talk and slide show on the creation of the Long Island Rail Road in 1834 and its very first passenger train from Brooklyn to Greenport and the ensuing festivities held on the Great Lawn of the Peconic House Hotel on July 27, 1844.

Our location is the Riverhead Free Library, 330 Court Street, Riverhead, NY 11901. Long Island Rail Road's Riverhead Station and convenient train and Suffolk County Bus service is adjacent to the library – Take the Train to the Forum! Ample vehicle parking is available at the library and in the municipal parking lot located across the street on Osborne Avenue. Admission is FREE and everyone is welcome.

The Railroad Museum of Long Island Riverhead Restoration Site & Visitors Center opens for the 2024 Season on Saturday, April 6, 2024 at 10:00 AM - 4:00 PM. The Greenport Museum and Saturday/Sunday openings to the public begin Memorial Day Weekend, May 25/26, 2024. Unveiling of a William G. Pomeroy Foundation Historic Transportation Marking will take place at Greenport RMLI on Saturday, July 27, 2024. Time of the unveiling will be coordinated with the arrival of the LIRR 180th Anniversary Excursion Train.

Judy was an influential member of the Oyster Bay Rotary Club and served as a co-chairperson of the annual Oyster Fest. We depended on Judy to provide her unique gift baskets which were always a big hit at our annual Summer Solstice.

Leon Daitz, passed on on January 31st. Leon personified the very essence of being a member of the Oyster Bay Railroad Museum. His presence at the Display Yard, alway "hands on " and working on many projects. Leon served on the Board and then decided to return to volunteering. He was a proud Navy veteran, a valued member of the East Rockaway Fire Department, and was well respected by all.

Both of them are sorely missed but their spirit lives on!

The Museum is officially closed until late April, but the activity at the Display Yard continues, despite weather conditions.

I am pleased to report that we inch closer to getting all finalized to complete the contract with OBRM, Town of Oyster Bay and Nassau County to proceed with the Loco #35 project. Dedicated volunteers have been working every Saturday on the Caboose #12 restoration project. The plan is to have it ready for paint and lettering by the end of March.

Work on the Ping Pong coach continues at a feverish pace. The north side of the coach has seen much of the rotted steel window sills and posts removed with new vertical supports welded into place. A shed is under construction to house our electrically powered air compressor and a second one for the antique stationary steam engine.
