






# April 2024

OUR MEETING WILL BE HELD ON THURSDAY, APRIL 18 NOT FRIDAY THE 19TH! Our April meeting will NOT be open to the public, ONLY LIST, RMLI AND OBRM members will be admitted.

L I S T trip chairman, Bob Grant, is working on several tours and trips for Chapter members this coming spring. We have scheduled a tour of the Danbury Railway Museum on May 18th! We will be meeting at Grand Central Terminal and taking a 11:02 A M train to Danbury with a change at South Norwalk. We arrive at 1:11 P M. We leave Danbury at 4:33 P M and arrive back at Grand Central at 6:49 P M after changing at South Norwalk. You have to make your own travel arrangements to and from Grand Central. We will make the admission arrangements with the Danbury Museum. We will have a train ride in the yard at 2 PM plus a yard tour. #### THEN and NOW

#### THEN:

"What's in a Name?"

In the April 1984 edition of the "Along the Track," which was 150th anniversary of the LIRR, the following column was noted.

LIRR's present-day names are derived, or changed or altered from colorful names of the past, and today's commuter would be hard-pressed to identify 1984 stations from the names that some had at one time. For example:

Far Rockaway – Lockwood's Grove Glen Head – Greenwood, Glenvale, Cedar Swamp Greenvale – Week's Station East New York – Howard House Rosedale – Foster's Meadow Great Neck - Brookdale

Did you know that the LIRR owned Traction or Trolley Lines that served many communities on Long Island? Some of the communities are as follows:

Rockaway Peninsula [Ocean Electric Railway] Northport, Amityville to Babylon [The Babylon Railroad], Bayport to Patchogue, Jamaica to Flushing and Amityville to Halesite [the Huntington Railroad] The Babylon Railroad went from Amityville to Babylon paralleling the LIRR tracks and then on Deer Park Avenue and Fire Island Avenue to the Babylon Dock. From there, you transferred to a ferry to get Fire Island. [Back then, there were no bridges to Fire Island] Did you know that the LIRR once owned a fleet of boats called The Montauk Steamboat Company? The boats sailed to various ports in New England from several ports on Long Island.

The LIRR is comprised of as many as 30+ predecessor railroads. There were two major competitors to the LIRR, the Flushing, North Shore and Central RR and the South Side RR of LI [SSRR]. The SSRR paralleled the South Shore of LI and became the Montauk Branch. The Central RR of LI was financed by A. T. Stewart who conceived Garden City as a model community. The Central RR ran from Flushing to Babylon. It ran through the present day Kissena Park Corridor, Floral Park, Garden City, Island Trees [presently Levittown] Bethpage, adjacent to the present day Route 109 to Babylon. A. T. Stewart's bust adorns the station plaza in Garden City. Garden City had as many as 5 stations serving it. Nassau Blvd., Garden City, Country Life Press, Clinton Road and Stewart Manor.

Penn Station opened on September 8, 1910. The first official train to Penn Station was a LIRR train. Even though the Pennsylvania Railroad built and paid for Penn Station, the first Penn RR train did not arrive in Penn Station until two and a half months later! The LIRR was owned by the PRR at that time.

Railroads had been known for only 9 years and most of their horsepower was still being supplied by real live horses when the Long Island Rail Road was chartered in Albany NY on April 24, 1834. It was noted in the April, 1984 edition of the LIRR newspaper "Along the Track" the following:

"Today, the LIRR is the oldest railroad in the nation still operating under its original name. More important, it is the busiest passenger railroad in the United States, providing the nation's most concentrated rail service to one of its fastest growing areas."

The above quote from 1984 is still true today!

#### NOW:

On April 24th, the LIRR will be celebrating its 190th Anniversary. It is planned that a celebration will take place in Grand Central Madison on that day at 10:00 am. The ceremony is open to the public as well as the media. If you happen to be in GCM at that time, I believe you will be able to witness it. There will also be LIRR memorabilia items showcasing various items across from the LIRR ticket windows.

If the ceremony is made available for viewing, I will try and obtain a copy or direct you to where it can be seen.

For most NYC train riders, honesty still seems to be the best policy. LIRR assistant conductor Christopher Nocito discovered a sack full of \$30,000 in cash on a Ronkonkoma bound train shortly after Christmas. He then turned it over to the MTA police. After asst. conductor Nocito turned the bag over to the MTA police, the owner of the money was located by looking through an appointment book that was found inside the bag of money.

Long Island native and rock star Billy Joel, recently revealed that he no longer takes a helicopter on LI to get to and from his work site, Madison Square Garden. Billy was noted as saying that he has safety fears over taking a helicopter so he decided to take the LIRR. In a recent interview with Stephen Colbert, Billy admitted that the turbulence of the helicopter would make him uneasy. "I now take the LIRR" he told Colbert. The choice of transportation to the Garden initially concerned his team but Billy said his commute has been uneventful. "People will sometimes look at me on the railroad and think, "Look at this guy, trying to look like Billy Joel, He's not kidding anybody," he related.

Like most Long Islanders who take the train to MSG, he now prefers the LIRR for his trips to MSG. Billy will play his 150th and final residency show at Madison Square Garden on July 25th.

The MTA is looking for a company to operate shops and restaurants inside the LIRR's Grand Central Madison Station. The MTA is looking for a firm to oversee the leasing the available 25,000 sq. ft. of retail space which covers 32 possible units of retail space. GCM presently serves approximately 65,000 riders daily. Right now, the anchor tenant of GCM is "Tracks Raw Bar & Grill" which when it was in Penn Station, was noted as having the longest bar in NYC. It was located in Penn Station for more than 30 years and moved to West 31st Street across from Penn Station when the LIRR concourse was being renovated. "Tracks" is expected to open in GCM this fall.

It was noted that the MTA will look for a mix of tenants similar to those found in Grand Central Terminal. Presently, GCM includes a mix of tenants including bars, restaurants, food purveyors as well as the Apple Store to Duane Reade.

### Railroad Museum of Long Island by Don Fisher, RMLI President

Our thirty-fourth Season at the Railroad Museum of Long Island began on Saturday, April 6<sup>th</sup>. This is a banner year for railroading celebrations on Long Island and the RMLI is planning an "Over the Top" Season.

It is the 190<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Long Island Rail Road. Created on April 24, 1844 the LIRR celebrates 190 years of operating under the same Charter and the same Corporate Name on Wednesday, April 24, 2024.

The Railroad Museum of Long Island celebrates the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the LIRR Allan Herschel G-16 Park Train that operates at Riverhead RMLI. On April 22, 1964 this park train began carrying visitors at the LIRR Pavilion at the New York World's Fair near the Shea Stadium-Willets Point entrance to the Fair.

We also celebrate the 180<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the "First Train to Greenport – July 27, 1844." It took the LIRR ten years to build the mainline from the foot of the East River at Brooklyn, NY to the harbor at Greenport, NY. Plan to celebrate with us at Greenport on July 27, 2024 as we unveil a William G. Pomeroy Foundation - New York State Historic Marker to commemorate the Historic Greenport Transportation District and the first train to the Greenport Terminal.

And to wrap up the Summer, plan to join us at Riverhead on Saturday and Sunday, August 24 & 25 for the return of the Riverhead Railroad Festival! With the sponsorship of our Suffolk County Legislator, Ms. Catherine Stark and the Suffolk County Department of Economic Development and Planning we are pleased to reintroduce the ever popular Railroad Festival to our friends and visitors!


